Gastro Jaunts around Norfolk Number 18:

"Talk about famine or feast, we hadn't eaten out for ages then we ate out for almost a week. It was my birthday, so I invited the family out for Sunday lunch, the problem these days is that lots of establishments ONLY do roasts on a Sunday, and I like a bit of variety. So, I checked out a few local places and was very impressed by the menu being offered by the White Hart at Hingham.

I had eaten there a couple of years ago and not been impressed; however, I had heard a few good reports and as it was now under different management, I thought we'd give it a try, and I'm so glad we did. Eight of us rolled up at 3pm on the Sunday and were immediately shown to our table by the charming and enthusiastic waitress (are we still allowed to use this term, or has it been Woked?). We were asked if we would like a drink straight away (always a good sign) then we all chose from the menu, I won't bother you with all the details suffice it to say I ordered the baked camembert, and Chas ordered the stilton stuffed figs for starters and half a rack of ribs each for mains. We all ate heartily and there were no complaints (which is a miracle for my lot!). A memorable, for the right reasons, Sunday lunch.

Monday late morning we set off for Sheringham to the holiday apartment we have rented for the last couple of years. We did the usual round of eateries: fish and chips, Thai, pubs etc but saved the best till last, one of our favourite eateries of all time Rocky Bottoms at West Runton. I know I have written about this before, but I feel it's worth another mention. We booked a table in the Glass Room (no dogs allowed- there are plenty of tables where they are permitted but at last a restauranteur who recognises that there are some people who do not like dogs around them while they're eating, sorry all you dog owners out there but it must be said, especially in the North Norfolk sea-side towns!)

What a load or rubbish:

- A booking system for Norfolk recycling centres is now being introduced.
- From 18 November you must have booked a 15-minute time slot to visit a Norfolk recycling centre.
- From Monday 11 November 2024 you will be able to book for 18 November onwards.
- If you want to visit a recycling centre before 18 November, you do not need to book.
- You can book up to one week in advance of your visit.
- Each time slot is 15 minutes. You will need to arrive within the time you have booked.
- There is no charge to make a booking, and you can make as many bookings as you need. Charges still apply for trade waste and household waste over the free limit.
- You can only book one slot at a time. But as long as they are available, you can book as many slots as you need each day.





This idea will be a car crash for certain:

Car parking charges are set to be introduced in five Norfolk market towns for the first time.

Users of 30 council car parks in Attleborough, Dereham, Swaffham, Thetford and Watton will have to pay for parking by autumn 2025.

Breckland said that ongoing budget pressures were forcing it to find alternative measures to pay the current bill for upkeep of the car parks, which amounts to £450,000 a year.

Each market town would have one car park offering the first hour's parking for free, with tariffs between 50p and £1 for the first chargeable hour across the district. The cost will then increase by about 40p per hour.

The cost to park for an entire day would range from £2.50 in Watton to £3.80 in Thetford. Charges would be enforced from Monday to Saturday between 8am and 6pm, with a flat fee of £1.20 for Sundays.

The council will allow free parking to be offered during a select number of days for each town to support local events on an annual basis.

Postscript from the Breckland Council Website:

Breckland Council has launched this public consultation to gather your valuable insights on potential updates to our town centre car parking system. Whether you own a vehicle or not this is a chance for you to directly influence the decisions that will ensure the long-term sustainability of our district's parking facilities.

Each year, the Council allocates approximately £450,000 to maintain our 30 car parks across the five market towns. As we look ahead, we want to ensure that our parking services can continue to meet community needs, while also being financially sustainable. This is why we are exploring cost recovery options, including a modest charging model, which would enable us to maintain and improve our parking facilities, whilst protecting all other Council services.

We understand this is an important change, and we want to design a system that works well for everyone. This consultation has been thoughtfully structured, with proposals such as: designated free parking periods, modest charges (to follow), and potential permits for residents, businesses, and volunteers. We are eager to hear your thoughts on these ideas.

Our commitment to transparency and inclusivity has guided us throughout this process. By contributing your thoughts, you will help us ensure that this new system reflects the diverse needs of our community.

This could be a very deer hobby:

Driver warning and tips from GEM: Deer are on the move.

- Figures from the British Deer Society suggest a car hits a deer every seven minutes in England
- The next few weeks will see a peak in deer mobility, as the breeding season gets into full swing
- Periods of highest deer activity tend to occur at dawn and dusk, coinciding with the morning and evening rush hour

Road safety and breakdown organisation, GEM Motoring Assist, is warning drivers to be on the look-out for deer on the roads. The next few weeks will see a peak in deer mobility, as the breeding season gets into full swing.

This means more deer crossing roads, with an increased risk of collisions, says GEM. Periods of highest deer activity tend to occur at dawn and dusk, coinciding with the morning and evening rush hour, increasing collision risks in areas where deer are common.

Experts believe the UK deer population numbers more than two million, and figures from the British Deer Society suggest a car hits a deer every seven minutes in England. Research from the RSPCA shows around 75,000 deer are involved in vehicle collisions each year¹, with 10,000 killed instantly.

The human death toll from deer collisions ranges between 10 and 20 annually, with an additional count of around 450 serious injuries. Industry estimates put the cost of damage to vehicles alone to be at least £17 million.

GEM head of road safety James Luckhurst said: "Autumn brings the risk of more deer activity, and it should not be a surprise to see deer crossing roads. The risk of a collision is increased because the shorter daylight hours mean we need to make more journeys in the dark.

"That's why we're encouraging drivers to be extra observant, and to know what to do if they come across a deer on the road ahead.

"Experts² say not to swerve to avoid hitting a deer. If a collision with the animal appears inevitable, then the safest option is to hit it while maintaining full control of your car. The alternative of swerving towards oncoming traffic or into a verge or hedge could be a lot worse."

GEM offers simple tips for drivers to reduce risk from deer collisions:

- Swerving to avoid a deer could prove a very dangerous if it leads to a collision with another vehicle.
- Take note of deer warning signs. These are placed in locations where wild animal crossings are likely, so keep your speed down and be ready to encounter a deer at very short notice.
- Don't assume it's just a countryside problem. Deer populations have risen and spread in recent years. Although rural areas tend to present the highest risk, deer sightings have become increasingly common in more urban locations such as on roundabouts, in parks and cemeteries.
- Be particularly alert at dawn and dusk when deer are most active.
- If you spot one animal, it's likely there may be others following, so don't speed up and assume the danger has passed.
- If you do hit a deer, report it to the police, even if you're uninjured and your car isn't damaged, as the deer may be fatally injured and suffering.

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What3words?

Every 3m by 3m in the world now has a 3-word address, this is the simplest way to communicate that precise location in an emergency. Emergency services across the UK are now using 3-word addresses to easily find and share locations in emergencies.

What3words has already been used to locate a hostage who didn't know where they were, respond to rural road accidents and locate a lost child.

Emergencies can happen anywhere, from a broken-down vehicle to a major natural disaster. A 3-word address can tell us a precise location anywhere in the world. This supports response teams in coordinating their operations.

With the geographical area we live and work in, this app could speed up how quickly help arrives when it's needed most. This can make the difference between life and death.


